DOING OUR PART

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Message from the Mayor

We are now into winter weather and are all happy to have the new Zorra Maintenance Facility (ZMF) to better house and maintain our staff and

equipment that are keeping our roads clear and safe every day.

The ZMF delivers a suitable work environment that:

- allows staff to properly maintain equipment
- appropriately houses tens of millions of dollars of equipment
- uses solar and geothermal to cost us all less in energy than the natural gas alternative over the life of the building
- advances towards our goal of 100% renewable energy
- pollutes less

The budgeted cost of the project was \$10,084,600. The total cost of the completed project was \$10,094,917. A cost overrun of \$10,317 or 0.1%.

But staff found another savings and it is now actually \$7840.48, or 0.08% UNDER total budget.

This project was financed by obtaining a debenture (loan) through the County of Oxford with Ontario Infrastructure and Lands Corporation (OILC) for \$8,641,600 with an interest rate of 4.44%, over twentyfive years. The remaining \$1,442,903 was contributed from the township's reserves (savings). There are no additional tax implications for the project as it is complete under budget and as financed. Zorra staff did a phenomenal job delivering a large, complex project under budget and advancing our collective goals.

Zorra has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the TVDSB to explore future co-build

opportunities. We now have the opportunity to work together to complete a construction or renovation project, with the goal of meeting the needs of students, their families and the greater community.

Zorra will consult with the TVDSB if considering building any new recreation or community spaces, and the TVDSB will consult with Zorra if contemplating any new builds or renovations to area schools (Thamesford P.S., Zorra Highland Park P.S. or AJ Baker P.S.).

Whether it's libraries, recreation spaces, or schools, we need to maximize the community use of the facilities our communities pay for. Where there are institutional barriers to that, it is our job to break them down and ensure effective and efficient use of tax dollars to maximize the services our residents use. Our children don't care if the municipality or school board owns the soccer field. Their parents paid for it either way. I believe this model has the potential to be transformational for our communities.

These are two projects that combined advance all three pillars of our new Strategic Plan:

- A Sustainable Community
- A Livable, Healthy Community
- A Fiscally Sustainable Community •

REDUCED LOAD SEASON - February 15 - April 30

An early reminder to all drivers of heavy trucks and equipment that the reduced load season takes effect for the period of February 15 to April 30 inclusive each year. In accordance with By-law 21-03, signs will be posted on applicable Township roadways.

HALF LOAD SEASON RATIONALE

- Minimize long term damage to infrastructure
- Problems caused when roads are soft often require major repairs
- Prevent additional damage to culverts and bridges
- Heavy loads do damage to road sub-base that is difficult to detect
- Changes in the size of agricultural equipment i.e. large liquid manure trailers
- Multiple aggregate producers in Township
- Infrastructure repair costs borne directly or indirectly by residents

All of the above lead to safety issues during Half Load Season.

NOTICE TO RESIDENTS... WINTER ROADWAY MAINTENANCE ON TOWNSHIP OF ZORRA ROADS

The winter level of service to be delivered is prescribed in the Minimum Maintenance Standards – Ontario Regulation 239/02 regarding snow and ice control. The Minimum Maintenance Standards are a regulation of the Municipal Act, 2001. Service will be delivered during the following hours:

Monday to Friday - 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. with additional hours as determined by weather conditions Saturday, Sunday, holidays - as determined by weather conditions.

Since the start of this program in September 2012, the Township of Zorra has collected and returned 3,193 lbs of batteries to Raw Materials Company for Recycling.



Building Department

Did You Know?

All electrical installations, renovations, and alterations are required to have an electrical inspection.

Electrical inspections are required by law and help protect the people in your home or building from electrical hazards. Electrical inspections are required to comply with the requirements of the Electricity Act 1998 and the Ontario Electrical Safety Code (Ontario Regulation 10/02).

All electrical inspections are handled by the Electrical Safety Authority (ESA).

Examples of work that require an electrical inspection:

- New Homes, additions, renovations
- Electrical service upgrades
- Installation of equipment such as water heaters, heat pumps, air conditioning, swimming pools, hot tubs, etc.
- Installation of outlets, switches, new lightning, smoke detectors (excluding battery-operated types)

Please remember, you may still require a Zorra Township building permit for your project, but it is important that you do your research and contact the Electrical Safety Authority if required.

To contact an Electrical Safety Authority representative, or to apply for an inspection, please call 1-877-ESA-SAFE or visit the ESA website at www.esasafe.com.

Additional Residential Units (ARUs)

ARUs are smaller, self-contained dwelling units (i.e., with their own kitchen, bathroom and sleeping areas) that are inside, attached to, or in a detached accessory building on the same property as a single detached house, semi-detached house or street fronting townhouse. ARUs can take many forms, such as basement apartments, attached suites, tiny homes and coach houses, but they must be smaller than the primary residential unit, within a permanent

building (i.e., not a mobile home or recreational vehicle), and connected to municipal water and sewage services, where available.

Thinking about doing an interior renovation this winter?

Examples of projects that require a building permit:

- Interior alterations for non-residential units
- Interior alterations for residential units if; a bedroom is created that will require an egress and smoke detector/carbon monoxide detectors, a garage is converted to a living space etc.
- Finishing an unfinished basement and adding/removing plumbing fixtures and insulation.
- Installation of solid fuel appliances (i.e. woodstoves and fire places)
- Plumbing systems, heating, ventilation
- Any structural changes or repairs (i.e. moving a structural wall)

Winter Fire Safety Tips

Heating, cooking, decorations and candles all contribute to an increased risk of fire in your home during the holiday season and winter months. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), home fires occur more in the winter than in any other season. As the snowflakes start to fall and the temperatures drop, it's important that you follow our winter fire safety tips and take the proper steps to make sure your family and home are protected from fire hazards.



PLAY IT SAFE IN THE KITCHEN

Cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home injuries, so it's important to know what you can do to help keep your friends and family safe while entertaining during the holidays and winter season (NFPA). The primary cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended stovetops and ovens. If you are simmering, baking or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the kitchen and use a timer for reminders. When cooking for longer periods of time, don't forget to use the exhaust fan or vent above your stove to help prevent carbon monoxide (CO) from collecting inside your home.



BE CAUTIOUS OF SPACE HEATERS

December, January and February are the peak months for heating fires, and space heaters account for many of our home heating fires, according to the NFPA. Space heaters should be placed a minimum of three feet away from anything flammable, such as upholstered furniture, tapestries, mattresses or bedding, and must be turned off when you leave the room or go to sleep to help prevent a fire. In addition, never store clothing on or around the unit, and never cover the cord or put anything on top of it. Also have a three-foot kid-free zone around space heaters.



DECORATE WITH CARE

As decorations come in and out of storage during the winter months, they also come with potential fire hazards. Nearly two-thirds of fires involving decorative lights are due to electrical failures or malfunctions. An important winter fire safety tip is to check light strings for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections, and throw out damaged sets. Also, avoid plugging too many lights into an outlet; overloaded circuits can overheat and cause an electrical fire. In addition, place any festive holiday decorations no closer than three feet from open flames, lamps and other sources of heat.

Winter Carbon Monoxide Safety Tips

Carbon Monoxide (CO) is an invisible, odorless, colorless, and tasteless gas. Common sources of carbon monoxide include any fuel burning devices, such as your stove, furnace or water heater. As outside temperatures drop during the winter months, things start to heat up indoors. Winter is a peak time for carbon monoxide poisoning as more people start to utilize their fuel burning devices. Learn how to help protect your home and family from an emergency this winter with our simple carbon monoxide safety tips.



NEVER USE GENERATORS INDOORS

In the event of a power outage, never use a generator indoors. Place the generator a safe distance from the home, at least 10-15 feet.



INSPECT YOUR FUEL BURNING DEVICES

Furnaces and other fuel-burning appliances can produce carbon monoxide if they are not working properly or maintained. Make sure to have your devices inspected regularly by professionals to help protect your home and family.



CLEAN OUR YOUR FIREPLACE FLUE


Make sure to clean out or have your fireplace's flue inspected before you light a fire. This will help prevent the flue from becoming clogged and prevent carbon monoxide from being trapped in your home.

USE KITCHEN VENTS ANYTIME THE STOVE IS IN USE



The kitchen stove is among the most frequent sources of carbon monoxide in the home. To help eliminate danger of overexposure, always run exhaust fans when cooking, especially during the holidays and winter season when stoves are left on for longer periods of time. Also, open a nearby window periodically when cooking to allow fresh air to circulate, and never use your stove to heat your home.

In the true spirit of the season, and to help keep family and friends out of harm's way, here are some tips and helpful hints for The 12 Days of Holiday Safety:

On the First Day ... prepare your home for the holidays – and safety. Make sure you have a working carbon monoxide detector, smoke alarm. Fire extinguisher and a first aid kit, if you live in an apartment or are staying in a hotel, know where the fire alarms and emergency exits are located.

On the Second Day ... make a plan. Your family may not be together when an emergency occurs. Plan how to meet or how to contact one another, and discuss what you would do in different situations.

On the Third day ... think about special needs. Establish a personal support network of friends, relatives, health-care providers, and neighbours who understand your personal needs. Write down details about accommodation needs, allergies, fismly medical history, medical conditions, etc.

On the Fourth Day ... decorate with safety in mind. Never leave burning candles unactended and keep them away from children and pets, decorations and wrapping paper. Cut cancel wicks short to prevent a high flame, and if candles are used in a centreplece, make sure they don't burn low enough to junct the decoration.

On the Fifth Day ... make your tree safe. When buying a real tree, check that it is fresh (needles are hard to pull off). Water the tree daily - trees can consume up to four litres of water a day. Place the tree away from high traffic areas, doorways, heating vents, radiators, stoves, fireplaces and turning candles. If young children are around, use safe decorations. Heath Canada has some great holiday safety tips.

On the Sixth Day ... keep lights bright. Only use lights that have been certified by a recognized organization such as CSA, ULC or C-UL. Make sure you use indoor lights inside your home and outdoor lights outside. Check the light strings and extension cords, throwing out any that are frayed or have exposed wires, loose connections or broken sockets. Never run electrical cords through doorways or under carbets.

On the Seventh Day ... choose appropriate toys. Always follow age recommendations when choosing toys for children. Pay attention to Health Canada's recalls and safety alerts.

On the Eighth Day ... get ready for severe winter weather. Bizzards, ice storms, and high winds can develop quickly. Listen to local radio or television stations for severe weather warnings and advice.

On the Ninth Day ... prepare your car for an emergency. Install writer tires and make sure windshield washer fluid is always topped up. Prepare a kit to keep in your vehicle in case of an emergency, with items such as a blanket, a candle in a deep can and matches, and first aid kit with a seat beit cutter. Use this list to help you.

On the 10th Day ... prevent illness. Protect yourself and others from getting the flu. A flu shot is the safest and most effective way to prevent infection, to reduce the severity of your symptoms if you do get sick, and to keep from spreading the virus to others.

On the 11th Day ... Jearn first aid. Knowing first aid could save a life. Contact your local Eanadian Red Cross or St. John Ambulance office to find out about first aid courses in your area.

On the 12th Day ... know the risks. Across Canada, we face a number of hazards, such as earthquakes in BC, bizzards in Nunevut and ice storms in Ontario. Knowing the risks where you are can help you better prepare and eliminate stress... especially during the holiday season.

FOWNSHIP DEPARTMENT INFORMATION



In December 2011, a Public Works Housing Committee was established to review options for renovating Zorra's two existing Public Woks Shops or constructing one centralized facility. The Committee carried out its due diligence in reviewing all options and made the recommendation to build a new centralized facility. A review of potential sites was carried out and ultimately it was determined the most economically feasible location was the Kintore Shop property.

The Township then purchased 6.5 acres from an adjacent landowner in 2014 with a plan to begin construction in 2018. Design began in 2018 and for budgetary reasons construction of the project was delayed until 2021. The project was tendered in late 2020, and the contract was awarded to Elgin Construction. Ground was broken in April 2021 and occupancy was granted in early September 2023. The last phase of the project concluded in November of 2023 with the commissioning of the geothermal bore field. A summary of budget and actual costs is noted below.

This project was financed by obtaining a debenture through the County of Oxford with Ontario Infrastructure and Lands Corporation (OILC) for \$8,641,600 with an interest rate of 4.44%, over twenty-five years. The remaining \$1,442,903 was contributed from the Township's reserves. The all-in cost, not including solar panels worked out to \$251.62/sq. ft.

Township Council praised Director of Public Works, Steve Oliver, for his oversight on this project. Coordination with SPH Engineering was key to keeping this project on budget.

Public Works Staff have moved in and are now working out of the new facility on Road 78. The building is large enough to store all equipment inside the building, allowing Staff a sheltered place for vehicle maintenance and repairs.





By-Law Enforcement Department

WINTER PARKING

Please be advised that the winter parking restrictions will be enforced starting November 15, 2023 and remain in place until March 31, 2024.

Parking is not permitted on any road or street from 1:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. 7 days a week during this period. Any vehicle owner found in violation of this by-law could be fined or have their vehicle removed/towed at owners' expense. The fine for this violation is set at \$50.

RECREATION VEHICLES

Notice to all RV/boat owners. The Zoning By-law allows front yard driveway storage of RVs and boats from May 1 – October 31. After October 31, front driveway storage of these vehicles shall be removed and stored elsewhere. The vehicles may be stored on your side lot or rear lot provided that they meet the 5ft setback.

LEAVES AND SNOW:

Did you know that it is a By-law infraction to push your leaves and snow onto the roadway or neighbouring properties? Depositing your leaves on the road or private property is considered dumping and is may result in a significant fine of \$700. Living in a beautiful rural community like Zorra means living in close proximity with wildlife. That's usually something we enjoy, but from time-to-time wildlife can pose concerns.

We've been getting a lot of calls into the office about raccoons lately. Here are a few things to remember:

- If you see a raccoon behaving strangely, do not approach it. Give it ample space, and make sure to keep children and pets well away. The raccoon will most likely move along on its own, given time.
- If you have a raccoon that is hanging around and not moving on from your property, you will need to contact a pest control company to have it removed. The municipality does not remove raccoons (or skunks, etc.) from private property.
- The Humane Society will pick up injured wildlife from private properties and there is no fee for this service.

To help keep your kids and pets safe:

- Don't encourage raccoons to visit your yard. Don't leave any food out, and keep your recycling and waste containers secure until your collection day.
- Talk to your children and tell them not to approach wild animals.
- Walk your dog on a leash, and make sure to check for raccoons before you let your pets outside in your yard.
- As raccoons may carry distemper, make sure that your pets have been vaccinated against the disease.

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Tax Department

Property assessment for the 2024 taxation year will continue to be based on the January 1, 2016 valuation date and will remain the same as 2023 unless there has been a change to the property. The **Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC)** is responsible for accurately assessing and classifying all properties in Ontario in accordance with the Assessment Act and Regulations established by the Ontario Government. If you feel that your property assessment is not a reasonable reflection of your property's value and/or classification, you can ask MPAC for a review. This review is free of charge. Visit **MPAC's AboutMyProperty** at www.mpac.ca if you have inquiries and to learn more about how your property was assessed, see the information MPAC has on file and compare it to others in your neighbourhood.

The Township is responsible to collect taxes on behalf of the County of Oxford and the school boards within our municipal jurisdiction. The Township also collects taxes on behalf of our policing and conservation authority partners. Property taxes are calculated based on the property's assessed value using the established tax rate for the property's classification.

PROPERTY TAXES ARE BILLED TWICE EACH CALENDAR

YEAR on an interim tax bill and a final tax bill. The interim tax bill will be mailed the first week of February 2024 and will contain 2 instalments, with the first instalment being due on February 29th and the second instalment being due on May 31st. The interim tax bill is calculated at 50% of the previous year's total taxes billed on the property. The final tax bill will be mailed in July 2024 and will contain 2 instalments, with the first instalment being due on August 30th and the second instalment being due on October 31st. The final tax bill amount is determined following Council's adoption of the Township's budget, the passage of the tax rating by-law for 2024, notification from the County of Oxford of the county tax rates for 2024 and notification from the Province of Ontario of the education tax rates for 2024. The final tax bill reflects the total taxes assessed on the property for the year less the amount already charged on the interim tax bill.

WHAT IS A SUPPLEMENTARY TAX BILL/NOTICE?

A supplementary tax notice is a tax bill issued by the Township which reflects any additions, improvements or changes in classification that have been made to your property as determined by MPAC. For example, owners of newly constructed homes will receive a supplementary tax notice pertaining to the assessed value of their house effective from their occupancy date. Owners may receive multiple bills for more than one tax year. Supplementary tax bills can also be issued for omissions of assessment. The supplementary tax notice is in addition to what may have been previously billed on the property. This tax notice does not include payments already made to your tax account or future instalments that have been previously billed and are still outstanding. Prior to receiving a supplementary tax bill, you should have already received a Notice of Assessment from MPAC indicating the reason for your supplementary/omitted tax bill(s). Payment options include: 4 instalments with payments being withdrawn on the regular instalment due dates for the amounts indicated on your tax bill; 10 instalments with payments being withdrawn from your account on the last business day of the month from January to October; or 12 instalments with payments being withdrawn from your account on the last business day of the month from January to December. Please visit the Forms page at www.zorra.ca and complete a Pre-Authorized Payment Application form if you are interested. Remember that if, for any reason, you wish to be removed from this payment plan, or if your banking information changes, you must notify the tax office in writing at least thirty (30) days before the next pre-authorized payment is due. If you are currently enrolled in the pre-authorized payment plan, you DO NOT have to re-apply each year.

Penalty charges of 1.25% will be added to instalments not paid and received by the due date. Interest charges of 1.25% are applied on the first day of each month until the balance is paid. Failure to receive a tax bill or arrears notice does not exempt the taxpayer from late payment charges.

Cross-country skiing draws to a close at Windy Hill Farm

Wildwood Polecats community recognizes efforts of Pete Baldwin, Steve and Cobi Sauder

More than 20 years of Zorra Township crosscountry skiing tradition came to an end in the spring of 2023 as Pete Baldwin and his trailgrooming team made the difficult decision to cease maintaining a network of trails on his 27th Line farm that had provided both a training ground for top-level athletes and a local venue for recreational skiers since the early 1990s.

"It's going to seem weird not having the trails and not having folks pulling in the lane after we get that first good snowfall," Baldwin said in a recent interview. "But over the last few years, we just haven't had enough snow to make it worthwhile."

Baldwin first started making recreational trails at Windy Hill Farm in 1984 – around the same time as he put in the first plantation of hillside trees on the 190-acre property, in a part of the former dairy farm that had been used for pasture and hay. He eventually planted about 70 acres of trees, to go along with some existing hardwood woodlot.

The Baldwin family were avid downhill skiers, with all three of Pete and his late wife Marge's kids spending time working at the nearby Ski-Hi facility. But Colin, his youngest son, decided one year that he wanted to try nordic skiing and announced that participating in the annual Wildwood Loppet would be a good place to start.

The Wildwood Polecats had formed as a provincially and nationally-sanctioned nordic ski club based at Wildwood Conservation Area during the half-dozen years that the 25-kilometre Wildwood Loppet was held there. It was a volunteer-run event but eventually attracted some higher-level participants for its around-the-lake course. Pete declared he would join Colin. He had read that top-level cross-country skiers boasted a lower resting heart rate, on average, than any other elite athletes. He figured this would be a good athletic pursuit to take up.

Pete had been a competitive cross-country runner in his youth, including as a member of the varsity team at what was then known as the University of Western Ontario in London. He had also played football at Medway High School and, later, spent many evenings playing recreational men's soccer in Woodstock and London.

When Colin and Pete arrived on that late 1980s January day to participate in the Loppet, "we didn't know there were going to be serious racers there." These racers took off from the start line and left the Baldwins – along with the other novices and newcomers – in their wake. It was, he remembers, humbling for both father and son.

"It was much harder than we thought. In the end, it just turned into 'do whatever you thought you had to do to finish.' I think we almost died!"



The trail network was used on a members-only basis by members of the Wildwood Polecats club. Inconsistent snow conditions led to the difficult decision to stop maintaining the trails this winter. It was, certainly, not the most triumphant debut. But buoyed by the sense of exhilaration he felt as he eventually strided across the finish line, Pete Baldwin was hooked.

"I got the (cross-country skiing) bug. Colin didn't. But I did"

Over the next 15 years, Pete – who took up the sport when he was in his late 40s - participated in dozens of long-distance ski races across North America. For a few consecutive years in the 1990s, he joined the Great American Ski Chase – a series of approximately 50-kilometre competitions that started in the late fall in New Hampshire, progressed through events in New York State and Michigan, and on to the largest of all Nordic skiing events in North America, the American Birkebeiner in Hayward, Wisconsin.

"The Ski Chase always wrapped up its season out on the west coast in California but I never managed to make it out there," he noted.

He also gualified for and participated in World Master's Championships races in Canmore, Alberta in 1995 and Lake Placid. New York in 2001.

But before he could even consider participating in any of those high-level competitions, Baldwin needed a place to train. And, with limited options this far south in Ontario (Circle R Ranch near Delaware has maintained a nordic ski trail network for decades but the snow cover is typically unreliable; the next closest commercial operations with good groomed trails are near Orangeville. Collingwood. Owen Sound and Barrie). he decided the trail network he had already begun on his farm would be the ideal location.

It happened that Baldwin took up the sport precisely when a transformation was underway from the old-style "parallel stride" method of skiing to the newfangled "skating" approach. Inspired by Olympic athletes who shaved minutes off their finish times by kicking their feet diagonally to the side rather than back-and-forth in a set track, Nordic skiers around the world gradually moved towards requiring an entirely different type of groomed trail than what was needed in the past.

At Wildwood, the groomed trail consisted of two parallel tracks. In some spots, these tracks passed through narrow stretches of tree-lined trail originally designed for walking.

Skate-style skiing required wider trails over the entire distance of the loop. But it didn't require the creation of two hard-packed parallel tracks. A well-packed - but not necessarily hard-packed - surface across the entire width of the path was the ideal surface.

The organizers of the Wildwood Polecats, mainly Steve and Cobi Sauder, gradually slowed down in maintaining the trails at Wildwood for recreational and racing use because they were impractical for skating. The annual Loppet ceased to run for similar reasons.

Pete Baldwin, who credits the Sauders for teaching him to ski in the newfangled style. approached them with his offer. They eagerly accepted, and were equally enthusiastic about helping him bring the dream into reality.

The first

"groomer" was a 50-horsepower, all-wheel-drive tractor driven backwards along



the trail network with a loader bucket lowered strategically to pack down the snow. "The neighbours got a kick out of seeing me do that," Baldwin remembers.

They soon switched to "a good-sized log" towed behind the tractor, eventually with a few old tires dragging at the back to smooth out the trail behind the log. "That was a lot easier on the neck." he admits.

He remembers some mornings after heavy, wet snowfalls when the tractor got into trouble. "Yeah, we got stuck a few times. But one way or another, we always got unstuck."

In 2000, Baldwin and Steve Sauder purchased a professional six-foot groomer in Vermont. They pulled it first with the tractor, before eventually buying a tracked utility vehicle that was still in use when they made the decision to cease grooming the trails last spring.

Baldwin notes the Sauders, as well as other members of the Wildwood Polecats – which continued as a sanctioned club, switching its home base to Windy Hill Farm – for hours of help in maintaining the trails. The Sauders, especially, handled Polecats administrative duties, including very affordable membership fees and insurance, that have allowed Baldwin to make his trails available on a membersonly basis without worrying about non-trail issues.

He has certainly done many hours of pruning over the years to keep the trails in good condition. But the Polecats also hosted Pruning Days each fall so all members and friends had the opportunity to help out.


High school teachers Mark Dewan (Stratford St. Mikes), Annette Wrigley (St. Marys DCVI) and Janet Thompson (Woodstock CI) also deserve credit, Baldwin says. These three brought dozens of young athletes to Windy Hill Farm to learn and train. Some of those athletes went on to glory at the WOSSAA (western Ontario) and OFSAA (all-Ontario) levels, and represent varsity teams at various universities in subsequent years.

The farm even hosted a couple of WOSSAA championship meets.

"That was fun. Blowing out the (farm) lane to get all those buses and cars on site at the same time as we needed to be grooming the trails – that was interesting," he remembers. "I'm not sure if I'll miss that."

But it's clear Baldwin is proud of what those young athletes accomplished. Three of them, the Sauders' three daughters, Marlee, Joanna and Janel, are featured in a photo attached to a tree at the entrance to the trail network off the Windy Hill Farm parking area. That section of the trail was given the name "Green Grove."

Elsewhere on the network, you'll find signs (and photos) advising that you're

approaching sections of the trail named "Zig Zag", "Rat Maze", "Pete's Peril", and "Mount Baldwin."

"It was the kids that named those trails. And some of them went on to great things."

Baldwin estimates there were years in the 1990s when area skiers could rely on sufficient snow cover at Windy Hill Farm through most of the weeks from mid-December to mid-March. For the past few years, however, the season has been limited to approximately three weeks. And some of those days the conditions were less than ideal.

Two things he refuses to estimate, though, are how many hours he has devoted to providing well-groomed trails for the area's nordic skiing enthusiasts, and how much of his own money he spent making it all happen.

"I don't even think about it," he said. "It's fun grooming. It's a nice way to spend an evening." "And it has been so nice having a way of using the farm. It's hard to think of not doing it."

Despite the loss of cross-country skiing, Pete and his wife Penny will continue offering outdoor sporting activities at their farm. As a "Millennium project" in 2000, Baldwin created a four-hole golf course on the property that two separate groups of golfers utilize on a weekly basis through the summer. And a cyclecross racing club based in Woodstock and London continues to use the trails for training.


